





4. Help

Registration: make sure you are allowed to vote!

All delegates and guests at the AGA need to be pre-registered before February 28th 2018. On-site registration takes place from March 2nd onwards; see Practical Information – Venues for addresses

Delegates

If you are representing a member organisation but are not one of the voting delegates of that organisation, you are welcome to join in the discussions of the Assembly but you are not allowed to vote.

Non-voting delegates have to pay a registration fee of \in 15 per person in order to be present at the Assembly.

Representation

After the decisions taken at the London Assembly (in 2000) and Glasgow (2016), a member organisation may be represented at the Assembly by another member organisation in accordance with Art. 11.3.4 of the Statutes and Art. 9.5 of the Bylaws of our Federation:

"Statutes: Art.11.3.4. Representation of members and casting of votes is possible as specified in the bylaws. The bylaws must contain objective criteria for representation of members and casting of voting rights."

• "Bylaws: Art. 9.5. Representation of votes. A member, who is authorized by other members in writing, can cast through its delegates up to three votes of the authorizing member(s). The maximum number of votes a delegate can cast is five.

9.5.1. A represented vote may not be transferred to another member during the General Assembly without approval of the vote owner.

9.5.2. The maximum number of votes (own votes and proxies combined) a member may cast is 10."

Voting Rights

Since the bylaws have been changed at the AGA in Duesseldorf in March 2017, this section is to clarify the procedure regarding the number of votes a member and its delegate(s) can cast at (future) General Assemblies of EGLSF is determined.

Voting rights per member:

Ordinary members:

According to Article 5.1 in the bylaws, all members must submit the membership form each year before the 15 January, in order to inform EGLSF about the number of the member's officially registered members ("affiliated members") on the 1st January of the current year. The number of votes an Ordinary member is entitled to depends on the number of its affiliated members:

Number of affiliated members	Entitled to:
1-24	1 vote
25-99	2 votes
100-299	3 votes
300-649	4 votes
650 or more	5 votes

Associate members:

Associate members who are a European legal entity are entitled to 1 (one) vote. Other Associate members (natural persons and non-European institutions) have no vote.

Honorary members:

Honorary members have no vote.

Appointment of delegates by members:

Each member with voting rights (Ordinary members and Associate members who are an European legal entity) is entitled to appoint one or more voting delegates to be present at a General Assembly.

The maximum number of voting delegates a member may appoint is equal to the number of votes the member is entitled to.

Associate members who are not natural persons and who have no voting rights may appoint non-voting delegates.

Associate members who are natural persons, and honorary members, may not appoint a delegate to appear at a General Assembly on their behalf.

Additional persons attending an assembly who are representing a member will be classed as non-voting delegate.

Transfer of votes:

Each member with voting rights (Ordinary members and Associate members, who are an European legal entity), who is not able to attend a General Assembly, is entitled to transfer its votes to another (or several other) member(s) with voting rights. However the maximum number of votes that can be transferred is 3 (three) (see Art. 9.5 of the bylaws).

Casting of votes:

The maximum number of votes (own votes and proxies combined) a member with voting rights can cast is 10 (ten).

The maximum number of votes (own votes and proxies combined) a delegate can cast is 5 (five).

Transferring of votes

In order to transfer votes, the member transferring votes must send a signed vote transfer form to the general secretary, or email <u>aga2018@eglsf.info</u> in which they confirm they will not be present at the Copenhagen AGA 2018 and that they are transferring their votes to a specified member. This form can be downloaded from our website (<u>www.eglsf.info</u>).

Members that are federations or umbrella organisations must take Art. 9.3. of the Bylaws into account when registering: " Ordinary members that are federations or umbrella associations and whose affiliated member clubs are represented at the General Assembly with their own delegates have to state this to the board before the beginning of the General Assembly. The number of affiliated members represented by the affiliated club will be deducted from the number of affiliated members represented by the federation/umbrella association."

Dealing with motions/amendments

Before the discussion is started, questions – and only questions – will be allowed to clarify the understanding of a motion. After the proposer of the motion has answered all questions, the discussion and decision-making may start.

Please keep the discussion within reasonable time limits

The discussion will be structured by the co-chairs in such a way that first three PRO arguments for the motion are heard, followed by three CON arguments. After that first round, we will determine if the assembly wants the discussion to continue. If so, the PROs and CONs procedure is repeated, and so on until the majority wants to stop the discussion and the voting on the motion and/or proposal can take place.

Breaks for reconciliation

A situation may occur that a point is brought up during the assembly that requires the board to consult, either among board members or with others. In this case the Board will ask the co-chairs for a short break for this to occur.

Presentation equipment

At the general assembly, there will be pc/laptop equipment (with PowerPoint) available which the delegates can use during the weekend. Delegates who would like to make use of this equipment are kindly requested to contact aga2018@eglsf.info before the Assembly starts, to ensure an efficient use of the facilities and equipment.





In the past we started documenting procedures for our activities. In 2018 we will continue this documentation process.

3 EuroGames

Contractual negotiations with EuroGames Rome 2019

After initial communication problems with the organising team, we are now confident that Rome is on the right path to producing a successful EuroGames in 2019. The contract is now signed.

The board visited Rome for discussions in July during the Italian Gaymes to inspect the sport venues and the Gay Village. Most of the venues are in very good condition. The Gay Village is very attractive with a huge cultural program very day. During the weekend three DJs were putting the heat on the spectators on three floors.

This year we will visit the organising team in Rome once more to check their progress.

Contractual negotiations with EuroGames Dusseldorf 2020

The contractual negotiations with Dusseldorf started right after the AGA 2017. Some points had to be discussed and changes of the draft were made. Some more sports will be offered at the EuroGames in Dusseldorf. And the team assures us they are able to organise these additional sports. The contract will be signed at the AGA 2018.

4. Member Activities

Member Activities

EGLSF works as a platform for our members to promote their activities. In this sense, our networks are our members' ones too. Clubs send their information and events to be published in our newsletters, Facebook page and twitter account. The board, as well as in quality of athletes, tries to be present in our members' events although it is materially almost impossible.

For the future we want to have more feedback about member activities so that we can promote them via Facebook and member newsletters.

We have negotiated a contract with Paris for a small discount for the Gay Games X for our members.

The EGLSF is eager to continue its path to inclusion and with this goal in mind we are working on a project with Leap Sport.

To continue our outreach to attracting more women to the EGLSF we are working on a joint project with women from FGG. In April 2018 we will host a "Women in Sport" conference in Cologne to go further with the work we started at the European Lesbian Conference with a workshop in October last year.

Member Renewal / Reactivation

We have now successfully integrated the new membership software which enable us to track the membership more efficiently. And enables you as member to view your club details at any moment.

Creating the Knowledge

Board members have experienced a lack of legacy transfer when joining the board. In our strategic plan 2015-2020, the board included this legacy topic so new members could be more and better informed about positions and duties when joining the board.

A few procedures and policies have been written up. Creating a comprehensive document is ongoing.

EGLSF and most of our members offer grants for participants from the outreach countries. In the case of AGA, every year an average of 6 delegates have had the opportunity to participate in the event, always following some issues regarding economic situation of the country, but also Human Rights conditions. In the last years, the board has also granted participants from non- outreach countries that, however, due to personal situation could not afford the attendance to AGA.

The board has updated the Outreach policy and it is available on the website.

Sports calendar

Our international sports calendar is now the reference of sports for our community (not only tournaments but also events) in Europe. We also received information from sports related bodies who want their events to be published but we still miss information from our members' tournaments, conferences, workshops, etc. acquisition with members. The calendar is now fully functional since last September 2016.

5. Leading organisation for equality in sport

Erasmus+ projects

We are partner in the following projects:

 VIDC (Vienna Institute for International Dialogue and Cooperation): Queering Football – Tackling Homophobia and Promotion Anti-Discrimination around Major Sport Events. We also added new banners for the German exhibition "Against the rules – Gay and Lesbian in Sport".

During the WOMEN UEFA EURO 2017 we organised Euro Pride House in Utrecht. There was also a meeting of the queer fan clubs from all over Europe as well to share experience and network.

We presented a Queering Football National Training to women sport educators in October 2017, focusing on awareness of homophobic attitudes and issues, awareness of LGBTIQ sport role models, experience handling homophobic situations via interactive situations.

This project finished with a networking conference in Ljubljana with participants from all over Europe focussing on anti-discrimination at major sport events like the past UEFA EURO 2016 and the outlook to the FIFA World Cup 2018 in Russia. At this conference we presented a workshop on "Campaigning for Change", which highlighted our experiences and lessons learned from our participation in the Queering Football project.

 Heroes of Football (Led by the John Blankenstein Foundation, Netherlands): Main purpose of the project is to start a European movement called "Heroes of Football". The main objective is to create awareness with individual soccer players of all ages and their environment of their own share in the equal treatment of people (LGBTIQ oriented) through sports workshops and a tournament day. The developed toolkit was updated in 2017.

 VOICE: Prevention of sexualised violence in Sports impulses for an open, secure and sound sporting environment in Europe with the following targets: Creation of a transnational network of experts and organisation on the topic of prevention of sexualised violence in sport; analysis of status quo in several European countries; compile a catalogue of good practice.

Relations with NGOs, sport organisations and advocacy within European Institutions

ENGSO (European Non-Governmental Sports Organisation)

24th General Assembly and Seminar, Paris 9-10th June 2017

In 2015, the EGLSF signed a Memorandum of Understanding with European Non-Governmental Sports Organisation (ENGSO), the objective of which is to strengthen the partnership between the two organizations, and work together in activities and projects promoting grassroots sport in Europe, with a special focus on tackling discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

The EGLSF, invited by ENGSO to attend its General Assembly in Paris at the Comité National Olympique Sportif Français headquarters, took the opportunity to learn more about the latest developments of the EU Sports Policy, and ENGSO EU Work Priorities as well as participate in the EU Seminar on "The Olympics and Para-Olympics as a catalyst for the promotion of participation in grassroots sport and social inclusion".

We were invited to address the assembly to explain briefly the work of the EGLSF and highlight how we are helping to advance diversity in sport via out three Erasmus+ projects.

Social inclusion and volunteering in sports clubs in Europe

The EGLSF was present at the European SIVSCE – Conference which was held in Brussels on the 28th of September 2017. The conference discussed the structure, organisation and management of European Sports clubs. The EU work plan for sport 2017-2020 has 3 priorities:

- 1. Integrity of sport
- 2. Economic dimensions of sport
- 3. Sport and society

A presentation on voluntary work in sport clubs, and the important connection with sports events revealed that recognition and support are the 2 most important factors in volunteering satisfaction, and organisations should always be aware of the conditions that volunteers are working in. The importance of having one person responsible for volunteer management also impacted on the success of the event, and to use migrant volunteers to make them feel more included in society. The findings showed a clear correlation between integration and volunteering.

The conference concluded with an open discussion on the future of social integration and volunteering.

The lively debate focused on the importance of volunteering, the current humanitarian situation across Europe and the call for projects that shine a spotlight on refugees and radicalisation prevention. Information about the #belnclusive awards was also presented.

Sadly, from a EGLSF point of view, the project included many minorities but the LGBTIQ community was not included. When asked the question, the response was that "it simply was missed".

EPAS (Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport)

The consultative committee and the consultative bureau of EPAS had last year four meetings. The EGLSF is a member of both organisations.

The consultative bureau and the consultative committee of EPAS concentrated on the following points:

Good governance

The Consultative Committee of EPAS (the CC) encourages governments to define minimum standards of good governance in cooperation with the sports organisations and other relevant stakeholders, such as athlete organisations, and condition public subsidies on the proven ability of the organisations to live up to those basic standards.

While welcoming the own efforts of sports organisations to develop, implement and monitor own measures of good governance as a necessary part of achieving better performance on their goals, the consultative committee believe that self-assessment and self-evaluation are not sufficient tools.

• Autonomy of sport/association freedom:

In order to ensure legal safety for sport, protect freedom of association and enhance democracy and the rule of law, the CC call upon the member states of the Council of Europe to equip EPAS with a mandate and sufficient resources to set up a framework for negotiating an international agreement that can define the respective rights and responsibilities of governments and NGO's in sport.

• Protection of athletes

All athletes must be better protected against systematic doping, especially when organised by the state or other powerful groups and individuals that wield influence over the athletes' life and career. States must never put their quest for sporting success over their obligation to protect the health, integrity and civic rights of any athlete that forms part of national elite sport structures.

• Match-fixing:

The Consultative Committee would like to kindly express its impatience with the lack of progress with regard to governments' signing and ratifying the International Convention against the Manipulation of Sport Competitions.

National strategic visions for sport

The Consultative Committee wishes to remind the ministers of the obligations they assumed when adopting one year ago, in November 2015 in Paris, the International Charter of Physical Education, Physical Activity and Sport. The charter includes a number of measures governments should take to ensure access to sport and physical activity "without discrimination of any kind, such as to race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status."

The Consultative Committee invites EPAS to analyse on which areas it can best contribute to realise the intentions of the Charter.

FARE Network

As in 2016, in 2017 worked with FARE to promote their two annual events: Football v Homophobia in February, and Action weeks in October, by disseminating information, creating publicity by reposting on Facebook and Twitter, and aiding members clubs with grant processes.

We also received a small grant as part of the October Action Weeks to help fund our participation in the first European Lesbian Conference in October 2017 in Vienna. This grant enables us to present a workshop: "Fields of sport: empowering or oppressive spaces for minorities - Lesbian in sport – the State of Play".

FGG (Federation of Gay Games) General Assembly

In 2017 the general assembly of the FGG took place in Paris. Over 100 delegates attended this assembly. Pepe Garcia-Vasquez represented EGLSF.

The members selected the three final bidders for Gay Games 2022 presented their bid and their cities. And all of them had to attend a questions and answers session. At the end Hong Kong was selected as the host for the Gay Games 2022.

Joani Evans was once more elected as the female Co-president. New in the board are Jan Schneider (Officer of Sport), Julie Williams (Human Resource Officer), Daniel Holland (Officer of Development) and Gene Dermody (Officer of membership).

ILGA (International Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Intersex Association)

This year we did not participate in the ILGA conference in Warsaw. So we missed the following content:

So at this conference, the members wanted to ask themselves how they put the needs and strengths of their own community at the centre of our work. They should look at how they can further strengthen local LGBTI communities so that they can come together, organise and demand for their needs to be addressed, in solidarity with others. The members wanted to continue talking about how they do this together with allies that connect their action to a larger mission for an inclusive and just society. Together, the members wanted to explore how they can contribute to reversing populism by working on common objectives and making democracy

An outcome of the ILGA conference last year was to organise a European Lesbian Conference, which was held in October in Vienna.

European Lesbian Conference

At the first European Lesbian Conference in Vienna we held a workshop about the participation of Fields of sport: empowering or oppressive spaces for minorities - Lesbian in sport – the State of Play. We focused on grassroots sports via three axes:

- The EGLSF a short introduction and where we are with diversity, parity,
- Lesbian in grassroots sports: regular clubs, founding gay and lesbian sport clubs, lesbian sport clubs, outside the club experience
- Lesbian in leadership roles: refereeing, coaching and decision making

As the only sport representatives present, we had a good amount of time to present the current state of play with the EGLSF, the EuroGames, club membership, and open a discussion with the attendees on lesbian participation in sport at a grassroots level.

Our workshop discussions raised important issues and brought home the diversity of our community. As well as being sportswomen we are also older lesbians, lesbians struggling to live in countries where our mere existence is threatened with the death penalty, feminists, lesbians of color and more. Sport is our way of expressing ourselves but our sport, our sports partners, our sports organisations and our sports leaders need to accept the diversity of our community and recognize that it is our strength. We are not there yet. But we are willing to take on the challenge, to try and move things forward and create a fully inclusive and safe environment for us all in which to enjoy our sports. We recognize there is no

A host of other workshops were on offer and we managed to attend several. What came out of all of them is that in sport, in media, in politics, in our health and education systems, and in our workplaces, lesbians and the "L" word are, once again, becoming invisible. By being invisible it is impossible to achieve our goals and improve our life situations. Our existing structures are struggling to keep up with, and for the most part, are no longer entirely valid as solutions for the complexities of our modern day living situations. There is "no one-size-fits-all" solution in sport or in other organisations, and we need to recognize, accept and work with this.

As sportswomen, sport is an integral part of our lives, and vital to our physical and mental well-being and we need to make sure that our sports organisations, at the grassroots, national and international level, reflect and our diversity and accept our differences.

EU Sports Forum 2017

The EGLSF was represented at the 2017 EU Sports Forum in St Julian's, Malta on the 8th 9th March. The EU Sports Forum is a gathering of EU sport stakeholders that is organized by the European Commission every year. There were interesting exchanges and debates on a number of pertinent topics for sport. These discussions were more relevant as the second EU Work Plan for Sport will be closing shortly.

The time was used to take stock and evaluate, adjust and progress in defending the integrity if sport, promoting sporting values, social inclusion and health. The opportunities from the Digital Single Market was also on the table, and an interesting talk from the eSport

professional player for AFC AJAX, Koen Weijland, showed how sports clubs are strengthening ties with their younger fans. This might be an interesting opportunity for our community to embrace the eSport culture, and maybe have it as an event for the EuroGames in Rome in 2019.

The integrity of sport has been severely damaged, and there is a call for all institutions to work together at all levels to restore it and build public trust. The EGLSF have 3 Erasmus+ projects running at the moment, The Voice, Heroes of Football and Queering Football, and the Forum proved to be a great launching pad to inform the rest of Europe the work we are involved with. The end of the conference was marked with a high-level discussion on good governance practices in European sport, and grass roots sports.

There is clearly still a large amount of work to be done around our core values of acceptance, diversity and inclusion, but now the EGLSF is known as the specialists in this area, and already there are requests for information and how other institutions and federations can benefit from our knowledge.

Pride House International – Women's Euro Pride House 2017

The EGLSF organised Women's Euro Pride House 2017, the first Euro Pride House to be held during a women's European Football Championship, in Utrecht from July 16th – 25th. Activities included an awareness campaign around the Euros with the used of the Quiz based on the one created for the Euro 2016. The Pride House was opened by Karin Blankenstein, president of the John Blankenstein Foundation, and there were representatives from the Dutch Olympic Council, the international press and volunteers from the local women's football team. Each evening a game was held in the stadium in Utrecht, there was a live transmission in the Bodytalk bar followed by an informal discussion on various topics, such as women in sport, the role of volunteers, football for all abilities and transgender football supporters.

The Against The Rules Exhibition was also on display throughout the duration of the competition.

Heroes of Football

The EGLSF was present at the #CALLITOUT – Conference which was held in Manchester on the 24th of June 2017. The National Football Museum hosted the symposium; marking the rise of the LGBT fan movement and offering an opportunity to debate issues surrounding homophobia in the sport.

Panel discussions addressed the alienation of LGBT fans at the forthcoming FIFA World Cup tournaments in Russia and Qatar, and how the police, other authorities and antidiscrimination organisations are tackling incidents of homophobia and hate speech which seek to exclude LGBT people from football.

The UK's LGBT fan movement has grown rapidly, with 27 professional clubs in England, Wales and Scotland now officially recognising their own LGBT supporters groups, and more currently in development.

Pride in Football chair Di Cunningham, of the Norwich City fans' group Proud Canaries, says increased visibility in the stands and on social media is having a tangible impact. The main key discussions from the day consisted of;

- Homophobic Hate Crime and Hate Speech in Football
- Russia World Cup (the topic was Workshopped and a Panel discussion)
- LGBT+ Fan Groups
- #Call It Out Challenging LGBT+ abuse
- Pride In Football the alliance of LGBT Fan Groups.



Abseitz Stuttgart e.V. - 25 Years of Diversity in Motion

Abseitz Stuttgart e.V., the sports club for gays, lesbians and friends in the Stuttgart region, will be celebrating its 25th anniversary in 2018.

Founded in 1993 by a group of gay men who wanted to establish a volleyball team, Abseitz was well supported by the local LGBT* community right from the start. The name "Abseitz" was derived from the Cafe Jenseitz, a popular LGBT* bar at that time. A badminton group and a women's football team soon followed and Abseitz went from being an all-male Volleyball team to a mixed multi-sport club.

Abseitz has experienced a significant surge in popularity since the early 2000s. A new sport has been added almost every year swimming, dancing, tennis, yoga, fitness, squash to name but a few. During this period Abseitz has also added a number of international LGBT* tournaments and local charity events to its repertoire. Our very own Wild Wild South tournament evolved from annual volleyball and badminton competitions to a biennial three-day multisport event with more than 500 participants. Each year in September, Abseitz organizes the "Stuttgarter LebenSlauf", a charity run to support the AIDS-Hilfe Stuttgart.

Such developments require structural adjustments and professional administration. In recent years, the club has taken a number of steps to ensure that it remains future-oriented: renting office space, hiring additional employees, delegating tasks to volunteers and contracting companies for professional services such as accounting, graphics or web design companies.

In 2018, the number of sports has risen to 20, and the club has around 750 members. Regular trainings take place six days a week, and there are many more extracurricular activities, such as workshops, excursions or hikes throughout the year.

The club's comprises a management board of five people, approximately 20 department heads and two employees. The Wild Wild South tournament and the LebenSlauf are organized by committees. The club also has its own magazine, which is edited by professional editors and published three or four times a year.

Abseitz has a solid financial basis with a budget of about €80,000 annually, usually closing with a slight plus. It also has enough assets to maintain its liquidity.

A large number of the club's members are willing to carry out volunteer work to varying extents. Stuttgart is a very international place, so we have native speakers of English, French, Spanish, Italian and many other languages.

Stuttgart, home to booming automotive and high tech industries, is more than just Daimler, Bosch and Porsche. Picturesquely located in the "Kessel", a valley between wooded hills, the city boasts a wealth of museums and theatres, five castles, a beautiful zoological and botanical garden, vast forests and vineyards all around the city, extensive park areas stretching right into its heart, like the Rosensteinpark and the Schloßgarten, but also world class architecture and a long engineering tradition.

Stuttgart has a huge pedestrian zone and a vivid nightlife in the Baden-Württemberg region. There are many reasons to visit Stuttgart, one of the most underestimated cities in Germany. There are plenty of top tourist spots located along the so-called "Halbhöhenlage", the more affluent regions that are located on the hillsides and overlook city in the valley below, with no shortage of stunning views across downtown Stuttgart.

Whether you want to go and see an opera or a musical, a football match, go shopping on the Königstraße, clubbing on Theodor-Heuss-Straße, visiting one of the city's great history or art museums, enjoying some relaxing hours in Stuttgart's mineral baths and spas, or attending one of the many festivals like the Volksfest or Germany' biggest Christmas market – there is something for everyone.

The weather conditions in the south of Germany are often the best in the country, with the most hours of sunlight annually – there might not be as much sun in March as in July, but nevertheless, the climate is great for getting outside as much as possible.

WELCOME TO STUTTGART

LGBT* Life in Stuttgart

Stuttgart is not exactly famous for being an LGBT* hotspot like Cologne or Berlin, but the community in Stuttgart is still a



considerable size, and it is well connected. There is a good number of LGBT* bars, cafés, clubs and one of the last two specialized bookshops in Germany. Germany's oldest LGBT* disco, the Kings Club, is also located here. Its owner, Laura Halding-Hoppenheit, has been fighting for equality and against discrimination for more than 40 years. She is a national heroine of the LGBT* movement and – it goes without saying – she has supported Abseitz from its very beginning.

Stuttgart Pride takes place each year in July, with two weeks of events and activities. In terms of numbers, its pride parade is the third biggest in Germany, beaten only by Cologne and Berlin. This political demonstration regularly garners nationwide media attention for its mottos, patronage or statements. The parade itself largely comprises many regional community clubs, groups and companies, as well as less commercial participants than in other pride parades. Abseitz is usually right in the middle of the parade with 50 – 100 members, many of whom join in on the go. At the CSD street festival, we feature some colourful fun sports right on the street each year.

There are five main protagonists in the local community with a close collaboration between them all: IG CSD (Stuttgart Pride), Zentrum Weissenburg (local LGBT* Centre), Landesnetzwerk LSBTTIQ (regional network of LGBT* groups and the regional government in Baden-Württemberg), AHS (AIDS-Hilfe Stuttgart) and – of course Abseitz.

We share rooms in collectively rented office space with the first three. For the 2020s, it is planned that this cooperation will evolve into a full central Rainbow House for Stuttgart's community that will include offices, event locations and conference rooms, assisted living for LGBT* seniors, guest rooms and possibly a day-care centre under one roof.

The community is well connected to the local and regional administration and government, so there is a great support for LGBT* causes among politicians both in the Stuttgart city hall and in the Landtag, Baden-Württemberg' parliament.

Getting to and around Stuttgart

Stuttgart is right in the heart of Europe. There are non-stop flights from most European countries to the international airport and high speed train connections from all directions. Getting around in the city is easy. There is a well-developed public transport system consisting of light rail and buses. There are two metro lines linking the airport to the city centre in about 25 minutes. For individual travelers there are several free floating car, bike or scooter sharing systems in Stuttgart.

Website and registration system

Abseitz has a modern, smartphonefriendly website that was re-launched in 2016. It is based on the CMS "Contao", and about 30 Abseitz members are trained editors or administrators.

All necessary information for the AGA 2019 could be put on one or more separate sites, and several people could make changes and modifications within a few hours.

For the AGA registration, we would probably be able to use our own registration system, set up for the Stuttgarter LebenSlauf. Payment methods are bank transfer, direct debit and PayPal. If credit card payments are a requirement it might be necessary to use a commercial registration system, for example the one that was used for the 2017 Wild Wild South tournament.

Outreach

Abseitz fully backs the outreach concept and the idea of offering support to those who need it, either financially or on a quid pro quo basis. In our club we usually follow the principle "benefit through effort" and so we are having a good number of volunteers for our internal events.

Our Outreach support could consist of priority assignment to private lodgings, a reduced conference fee or subsidised travel expenses. We will also be asking some of our sponsors about possible funding.

Accommodation for AGA Participants

Based on our experience with several big events staged by our club and our members in the past, we are confident that we will be able to provide hosted accommodation for 30-40 persons.

In addition we also have special arrangements with some hotels in Stuttgart that will reserve a certain amount of rooms specifically for our AGA event. Double rooms will cost around 80-100 \in and single rooms around 60-70 \in . As Stuttgart is the capital city of the region and is home to a wide range of industrial and commercial sectors, there are hotels for all budgets. We also are in contact with hostels, for instance one that belongs to one of our members, called Alex 30-hostel or the A + O Hostel, that offers cheaper rates. We will hand in a more detailed list of accommodation options later.

AGA 2019: VENUES & SCHEDULE

Short distances in central Stuttgart

AGA 2019 guests will most probably be able to reach everything by foot. All hotels, venues and event locations will be within walking distance from the central station or three or four metro stops away from it.

On Thursday we will kick off with the EGLSF board meeting in the well-equipped premises of our friends at the AIDS-Hilfe Stuttgart in the beautiful Stuttgart Westend.

We are considering the "SpardaWelt" event center as the main venue for the whole weekend to host the Conference on Friday and the subsequent AGA. It is located right next to the central station in the heart of Stuttgart.
